Miss Hilary Munday

We are saying goodbye at the end of this year to Miss Hilary Munday, following an incredible 45 years at RGS. Following her graduation from Aberystwyth, she took up her first post here in 1979 as a teacher of French. Miss Munday was one of only seven female teaching staff of a total staff of 70. Female teachers had their own Common Room in those days! She was promoted initially as 'Mistress of the Canteen' (sic) followed by leadership roles in Careers and Languages. With the support of the then Headmaster, Mr Roy Page, Miss Munday applied for and the school was awarded 'Specialist Status' in Modern Languages (specialist colleges ceased to be funded about fifteen years ago). It was this work that put RGS on the map nationally and has fortified the provision of MFL teaching since.

As an Assistant Head, Miss Munday has continued to fly the flag for languages not only in the classroom, but also on many trips over the years. Careers Education - another topic close to her heart which she champions passionately, has been on the RGS Vanguard, with a vision that we should have professional Careers leads in the school to offer the right level of support, soundly fulfilled.

Miss Munday has essentially been the School's engine room for twenty years, making sure that processes from timetables, rotas, parent letters, option choices, university entrance and the school calendar are well-oiled and provide the framework for RGS to operate effectively.

Countless hours have been spent supporting individual students on their future pathways as well as being a welcoming, listening ear to staff.

When I arrive at work in the morning, Hilary's car is invariably there before mine; unless there is an evening event, when I leave at the end of the day it is still there. I have had nearly nine years of the calming, reassuring presence of her BMW being in the car park in the morning.

We will all miss Hilary, terribly, softened by the fact that she will be returning on an occasional basis for the next few years as the RGS Archivist.

I am sure that you will join me in thanking Miss Munday for an incredible contribution to RGS. 45 glorious years. Happy retirement!
